



Camerata New England Piano Trio in April 9 Concert

The 2017 Taylor Concert Series continues with the Camerata New England Piano Trio, featuring Violinist Omar Chen Güey, Cellist Linda Galvan and Pianist Evelyn Zukerman. Music will include selections by Mozart and Rachmaninoff. The event is Sunday, April 9 at 3 p.m. in Taylor Community's Woodside Building and is free and open to the public.

Güey, a native Brazilian, has performed internationally as a soloist with orchestras, in recitals and chamber music concerts throughout the world. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Stony Brook University, a master's degree from Julliard and a bachelor's degree from the Manhattan School of Music.

Galvan holds a Bachelor Musical Performance degree and Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music and was a two-time Fulbright Scholar, studying with Maurice Gendron in Germany. She's been on the faculty of the University of Victoria (British Columbia), performed with the St. Louis Symphony and is well-known as a private cello teacher.

Zuckerman began her piano studies at the age of three and by six was giving public performances in New York City. She is a graduate of the Julliard School with Bachelor's and Master's degrees in piano. She has taught at Tuft's University and the New England Conservatory of Music. Currently she is teaching piano, coaching chamber music and performing regularly in the Upper Valley.

Camerata New England performs in chamber groups of different sizes to offer communities in and around New England access to professional, live musical experiences of the highest quality.



Laconia Fire Department

March was another record breaking month at Laconia Fire Department. And it wasn't necessarily caused by the winter storm that blew through town on the 14th...there were 379 emergencies in the month. That's a 13% jump over last March, but amazingly it's a 71% increase since 2010. March is historically one of the quieter months, but that is no longer the case.

For the first quarter of the year, the Fire Department has already responded to 1,136 emergencies. That's up 9% from last year, and it's up 46% since 2010. Looking at the type of emergencies, medical emergencies account for 74% of all calls. There have been 57 high priority patients since January 1.

We handled 12 fires in buildings in the first three months of the year, and we've assisted at five fires in other towns. Sixty-nine percent of all calls have been in the central area of Laconia. Seven percent have been in the Weirs area. Lakeport area accounts for eight percent. Six percent accounts for calls to other towns. The remaining ten percent of the calls are evenly divided among the north and south ends of the City. There were very few calls in the lakes area this winter.

We track how many units respond to an emergency very closely. Year-to-date, 70% have been single unit responses; 17% have been two unit responses. These two-unit calls are the serious medical emergencies where extra help is required. The remaining 10% required multiple unit responses. These would be high risk calls, such as building fires, motor vehicle crashes, and high risk alarms at places like the hospital.

In addition to the emergency calls, the firefighters are doing several safety inspections, fire and EMS training, and checking their apparatus and equipment daily. Besides going to emergencies, their most important duty is making sure we are ready and our equipment is ready at a moment's notice.


Every year, fifth grade students run the Woodland Heights store with the guidance of a fifth grade teacher. At the beginning of the school year, fifth graders have the opportunity to apply for a "job" to work at the store. Students are required to fill out an application, answer money questions, and obtain parental permission. Students are then "hired" and come in early one day a week to set up and run the store. Students learn valuable customer relation skills, money handling skills, and leadership skills while running the store.

Over the course of the year, members think of different ways to give back to our school and community. Because of the Peanut Butter and Jelly drive, students felt it was needed to donate money to the GOT LUNCH! Laconia program to support the purchase of other items such as bread.
